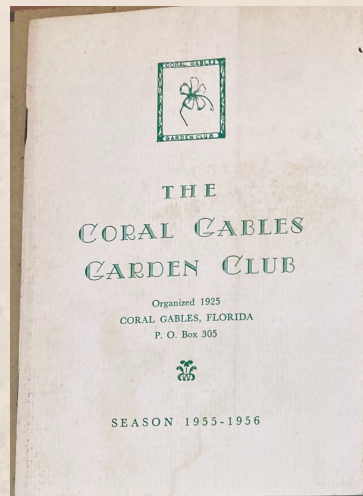

## Magazine Tells How Garden Grows Even In Hail, High Water

"How does your garden grow?" That's the \$64 question and the first thing every newcomer wants to know, once he gets to South Florida and decides to make this section his permanent home. And it isn't only how a garden grows, but what it grows, that become important factors in his life, once he gets sand in his shoes.

It's a man-sized job, answering these and thousands of other queries connected with tropical gardening, where climate, soil, and more than 57 varieties of garden pests that ravage this section of the country, are something to cope with.

Man-sized chore or no, it's a group of seven women who have tackled the job, and are doing it very nicely, thank you.

Through the 40 or so pages of a monthly magazine, "Tropical Homes and Gardening," these women teach some 15,000 people, in 12 monthly lessons each year the whys, whereas and wherefores of gardening in this land of sunshine, warm weather, bugs and worms!

Sometimes the postman brings mail to MR. B. S. ALLEN, Publisher and Editor, "Tropical Homes and Gardening," but

when this happens the title is a misnomer, for the originator, editor and publisher of "T" and "G" although a dynamo and go-getter when it comes to determination and accomplishing things is, in real life a very petite, very feminine, and very pretty young lady by the name of RUTH STUART ALLEN.

## Going Places

Just to prove that this publication is really "going places" (the editor says there's nothing to stop it and its going to go more and more places) here are some statistics; in the two and a half years of its existence, circulation has increased from a meager 2,000 or so, to its present figure, which tops 15,000.

Not only has the magazine gained national fame by going into the homes of persons from all over these United States, its editor has done likewise—was featured in an article in last November's "National Publisher," as well as the current issue of "Matrix," which carries an article on this amazing, energetic editor who travels 3,000 miles a month, or 35,000 miles each year, going places in the interest of advertising, circulation—and Florida gardening.

Also, if present plans work out, the gardening publication, its all-feminine staff, its office, which is located on Alcazar Ave., and which some people refer to as the "Security office" because it is "manned" entirely by women, will be saluted in a fall program of "Florida Story," radio feature of the Florida Power and Light Company.

Guided and directed by Miss Allen, who used to publicize the activities of clubwomen here when she was a newspaper gal, serving as club editor of the Miami Herald, others who occupy the publication's office and powder their noses each day before the same mirror there are JEAN (MRS. DON) WILSON, assistant editor; MRS. EVELYN McNEAL, office and promoter; MRS. MARIE BROWN, office; EVELYN GULICK, secretary; BETTY PEABODY, who assists with circulation and MRS. ELIZABETH COX, circulation (her home housed the original subscription records, when the magazine was in swaddling clothes and could nowhere near afford anything so grand as an office).

## Dirt Digger

It was "a natural" that Ruth Stewart Allen start a gardening magazine—she has always had it in mind to direct a sectional publication of some kind and she has always been a dirt digger. All she did was combine the two interests. She has always had a garden, even though at times its been only one flower bed, and at present consists of window shelves in an apartment.

The editor, who has a refreshing, vital personality, is humorous, along with being efficient and business-like, and most friendly. She lived on a farm when she was a child—a wheat and flax ranch in Montana, where "freeters" and "blows" cut crop raising to a matter of success only every three or four years. For a while Miss Allen lived in Des Moines, where she was on the staff of the Des Moines Register, at one time she had a publicity set up in Chicago and she spent the war years in Jacksonville, employed in the Office of War Information as Assistant State Director.

For a while—before Tropical Homes and Gardening claimed her entire life—Miss Allen did columns and was consultant here for "Better Homes and Gardens Magazine," from 1947 to 1950 she was club editor. During her childhood the Miami woman dug dirt on a farm in Tennessee and it was her hands (and hoe) that beautified a Des Moines Episcopal Rectory garden, and saw to it that this garden produced creditable vegetables and flowers.

Right now an eight foot apartment window is abloom with rare tropical flowers and exotic greenery, some of the specimens she found out about when she came to Florida (she admits she had to carry a hortus around with her and study constantly the spelling and pronunciation of tropical names), made abundant by some of the chemicals written about in her magazine.

Miss Allen is the first to admit she isn't qualified to write technical articles on gardening—not only isn't but doesn't. As editor, she gets experts to write such features—and even then, checks and rechecks facts therein contained.

As executive secretary of the Hibiscus Society, though, she has learned a lot about this kind of flower, the 800 or so varieties of hibiscus now "on the market," and knows whereof she speaks when she gives talks in behalf of this organization, which has as its aim the planting, propagation, growing, and registration of hibiscus.

## Capital And Korea

No capital (or very little), was a handicap in formation of the Tropical Homes and Gardening magazine, and the advent of Korea was another hazard the editor had to overcome when the magazine got its charter in 1950 and put out its first edition in October of that same year.

There have been other hazards the editor-publisher has overcome too—once a near hurricane and flood, when she got caught in her car; another similar occasion when her trusty steed (car) failed to function. But overcome them she has,

## What They Want To Know

How to do, and how to plant articles are the most popular type in her magazine, according to the editor. Floridians often need gardening information, but it's the newcomers who are most enthusiastic, and ask the most questions. Most of persons in the latter category try to grow everything they've never grown before—get cuttings galore, and don't understand why they all won't grow, even in such soil as coral rock, sand, etc.

Many want a plant identification service, which the magazine endeavors to supply through its pages. Magazine information covers all of Florida, and articles prove over and over again, that while some plants from North Florida don't grow here, few South Florida flowers, given proper attention, can't be raised in the northern part of the state.
