# Garden Tips Grow Alongside the Blossoms

Like the plants on display, the Metropolitan Miami Flower Show has grown and blossomed since its beginnings 30 years ago. This year's show, running today through Sunday at Coconut Grove Exhibition Center, may be the best one yet.

More than 25,000 grass-roots enthusiasts are expected to visit the show, which is being formally cosponsored for the first time by the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association. This year's theme is "This Wonderful World of Knowledge," and the emphasis will be on gardening tips, plant clinics and assorted seminars, in addition to the thousands of floral arrangements that are displayed each year.

"The idea is to educate the public, show them plant material and point out to them what they can grow, how they can grow it and the different things that are available to them," says Flower Show spokesman Winnie

"WE HAVE DEMONSTRATIONS on irrigation, how to spray fertilizer, new farming equipment, along with two theme gardens and the plant competitions. There will be something for everybody, a regular wonderland of gardening."

The display area of the show was designed by landscape architect David Scully. "More than 100 very large trees, about 10,000 plants and roughly 500 tons of sand have been used to give the auditorium the look of a park or a natural setting," Scully explains. "Rather than display the plants in rows, as has been done in the past, they will be in banks to create a sort of garden out of the individual plant-show entries."

Exhibitors will be competing for ribbons in such categories as rare tropical species, bromeliads and succulents, roses, rare fruits and landscape plants. More than 100 accredited judges will be on hand, coming from as

far away as Colombia, Guatemala, Costa Rica and El Salvador.

ALSO ON DISPLAY will be more than 140 artistic exhibits and designs that use plants. And there will be more than 100 booths offering top-quality plants for sale.

Perhaps of the greatest value to the public will be the chance to ask the experts plant questions. Professional landscape architects, nurserymen, research scientists and representatives from virtually every plant society in the area will be on hand.

Among the groups presenting educational displays are the Aroid Society, Bonsai Society, Bromeliad Society, Cactus and Succulent Society, Fairchild Tropical Gardens, International Fern Society, Palm Society, South Florida Fern Society and the Tropical Audubon Society. There will also be hourly lectures and demonstrations on a variety of subjects.
