






An Arbor Day celebration in Coral Gables this week will feature the planting of three royal poinciana trees and the awarding of a prestigious national honor.

Dollar savings are equally impressive. Coral Gables pays Metro-Dade County \$36 a ton to dispose of Dade County \$36 a ton to dispose of its waste. If newspapers are separated from other trash and garbage, the city can save \$26,208 in county disposal fees. In addition, resale of the paper would be for a minimum of \$24 a ton, or \$17,472 annually — a total savings of about \$43,680.

"Money is not the most important thing," said Frances Reid, committee chairman, "but to save the landfulls." She said Dade County is facing a terrible problem of waste disposal. "Anything recycled will be worthwhile to save our environment," she added.

Previously, the committee had no budget, she said, and went to the commission for any expenditure. So when Mike Barger, committee secretary, city laison and director of public service, proposed recycling the newspapers to make money for landscaping Coral Gables, the idea was well received.

He, in turn, said he'd been inspired by a Metro-Dade conference, Recycle '87, which encouraged the public and municipalities to cut back on waste by recycling it.

"We understand there will be mandatory legislation for recycling paper by the state," Mr. Barger said. "Municipalities will be required to reduce their percentage of waste."









Back again to her love of writing, Pat Gabriel wrote the text for the Villagers' book,





French City Village is a term used recently to distinguish the homes here in the 1000 block of Hardee from those further east in the 500 block.



In 1925 George Merrick's Coral Gables Corporation
conveyed by Warranty Deed 100 lots to the American
Building Corporation.* Merrick's Corporation was to
have exclusive privilege and right of selling the
residences that were to be constructed. There were
also numerous deed restrictions that are still in
effect inday. effect today.

The homes on the north side of Hardee are distinctly different than those on the south side. The north side homes were designed by New York architect Mott B. Schmidt. The most apparent difference in their design is the use of a 7 foot difference in their design is the use of a 7 foot high wall set on the property line which encloses all of the Schmidt homes that front on Hardee Road. The homes are then set back from the property line varying distances so that courtyards are formed at the front of each home. These homes cost from \$33,000. to \$35,000 to construct. The homes on the south side of Hardee were done by architect Philip L. Goodwin of New York Gity. They are set back only 1 foot from their Hardee Road property line.



Council of Garden Club Presidents of Dade County

The Council was formed in 1922 to serve as the Mother organization of the individual garden clubs in the Miami area, and was named "Presidents Council of Allied Garden Clubs." The membership in this Council was composed of all presidents, past and present of the various garden clubs in the Greater Miami Area.

Meetings were held in the homes of the members, and later in the amphitheater in Jungle Park (now known as Simpson Park). From the beginning the Council was involved and concerned with the environment, beautification and general community service. Even back in the late twenties, the members were concerned with the removal of "unsightly billboards."

Realizing the benefits that any united effort right be recognized as having proper backing; the Council became a member of the Florida Federation of Garden Clubs in December of 1937. Because of the need for o central location in which to hold the monthly meetings, the Council began holding various tours, flower shows and other activities in order to raise money with which to build a Garden Center. Cn November 10, 1941, just a month before Pearl Harbor, the Garden Center was opened at Simpson

Today, approximately 46 years later, the Council is still olding monthly meetings in the same building, and the members are still concerned with the same tenets that fostered its organization.



Florida Expert Unravels **Botanical Mysteries**

"One way to have more time for work is to never take 'sick leave.' I the thing because it's gravely needhaven't missed a day of work since 1952. Not bragging, just grateful."

By 1952, when Dr. Julia F. Morton, D. Sc., F.L.S., took her last day of sick leave, she and her husband Kendal had been collecting and classifying botanical data 20 years,

They began their work during the Depression, in part because of their awareness that information about edible wild plants could be used to augment the meager diets of hungry people.

"Germany was making bread out of sawdust and everyone was hard up," says Morton.

Today Julia Morton works 11 hours a day, seven days a week, collecting and disseminating botanical information from the Morton Collectanea at the University of Miami in Coral Gables. She claims she works best on solar energy, the energy she gets from watching the sun rise as she goes to work.

Fruits of Warm Climates, dedicated to the Florida State Horticultural Society Centennial 1987, is her most recently published book. This is not a beautifully illustrated addition to the coffee table or Christmas gift. It is Morton's response to a request for an economic guide for people living in developing countries who are desperate for information in order to produce exports for foreign exchange.

Fruits of Warm Climates is, in itself, a symbol of a lifetime of work, a gift to mankind, literally, since Morton expects to make no profit from it and, in fact, spent her own money to meet some of the publishing expenses.

"I don't charge fees for my services," she says, "I can't be bought-I don't belong to anyone."

Although her latest book on eco-

"I just had to buckle down and do ed. I never leave a project like that. If I did, I would never come back to it." she says.

Responding to a need of the marines at Opa Locka, Morton compiled a book of Wild Plants for Survival in South Florida. Information came, not just from the files, but also from the field. And while in the field, Morton was the experimenter who sampled wild plants to find out if they were edible


"I've had some close calls, but I have no right to talk about plants if I'm not willing to test them," she states emphatically.

When Kendal Morton died in 1964, Julia Morton was thrust, as # response to a request from the National Cancer Institute, into a quest that continues today. He assignment was to find out if there was a botanical basis for the fivefold.jump in the rate of esophageal cancer in the Bantu tribe of the Transgei in South Africa. For her research, Morton went to Curacao, a location also with a high rate of esophageal cancer.

"There's a lot of interest in cures for cancer, but little interest in the causes," she says. But through botanical sleuthing, despite vocal doubts about the merit of her work, Morton traced a common denominator of tannin in the victims of esophageal cancer in Curacao and South

Morton would send plants back to the states to be freeze dried and laboratory tested. The results of the tests showed 100 percent growth of tumors in rats tested with plants used to brew a "bush tea," high in tannin content.

Again in South Carolina, where a high rate of esophageal cancer exists among the natives of the lowlands, cancerous tumors developed in rats injected with a solution

If you think Metromover is a concrete and steel contraption, you haven't seen how they do it at the Metropolitan Miami Flower Show.

The Metromover, Biltmore, Bayside, Calle Ocho, Mayfair, Watson Island — all these features of Miami and more will be interpreted in floral form by hobbyists at the 37th annual show from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. today at the Charles Deering Estate, 16701 SW 72nd Ave.

White tents on the estate's grounds overlooking Biscayne Bay will house plants entered in horticultural competition, lectures and demonstrations, and commercial vendors who will sell plants, crafts, food and

The floral creations will grace the halls and chambers of the Deering stone mansion.

Fitting touches

The white tents and flowing bubbly are fitting. This year, a commercial designer has draped the bay side of the Deering home with swaths of white fabric and garlands, as if for a wedding.

It's but one of the many "Moods of Miami" the show aims to capture for the 10,000 visitors that organizers hope to

The show this year will feature more educational exhibits by South Florida plant societies. conservation organizations and hobby groups, a greater variety of food — including homemade bread and tropical jams and ellies - and more commercial booths, show President Lynn Jones said.

"The public likes to come and buy," Jones said, noting that the

elaborate floral creations will not be for sale.

Hobbyists entering the floral design competition must demonstrate their creativity within-the confines of strict guidelines set by show organizers to match this year's theme.

The designers must use the type of materials — such as foliage and fruit to depict the Goombay Festival — dictated by the show's floral director. Some creations will be 6 feet tall, some miniature.

"Many of these things have been in the making for three or four months," Jones said. "They make the same thing over and over again at home to perfect it."

Funds for center

Proceeds from the show will benefit the Garden Center Fund. which now totals about \$135 .-000, Jones said.

Under an agreement with Dade County, the show raises money for a county garden center that would be a headquar-ters for garden clubs and plant societies, a branch office for the county Cooperative Extension Service, and a demonstration site

for lawn and garden care.

Admission is \$5 for adults, \$4 for those 60 and older, \$2 for ages 6 through 12, and free for children 5 and younger. Today's events include:
