## THE WHITE ELEPHANT TRUMPETED WILD SUCCESS!



A new event, the White Elephant Sale, brought fun and profit to the Club. Brainchild of 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President, Judy Mangasarian and President, Betsy Tilghman, the sale quickly gained interest and support from our members, and even some non-members. Kitty Winkler chaired the event and the committee members were Mari Arnold, Connie Cabeza, Nina Jarp, Brenda Martinez, Michele Wiseheart, and Hallie Yanno. Three donation days filled the Garden Center with beautiful household items and designer fashion accessories. The committee transformed the Garden Center to a retail establishment, and the sale opened for business at 9:30 on November 26. Shoppers included Club members, their guests, and Biltmore guests who couldn't resist our bargain prices. The sale was a social and business success, bringing in \$1670 that can be used for Club projects.



### SMALL BUCKET COMPOSTING:

This is another easy way to make composting for your garden; I have been successful making it in 1 to 5 gallon plastic containers.

I do the following: fill the bottom of the bucket with  $\frac{1}{2}$  to 1 inch soil; next add 1 inch dry leaves; next add kitchen trimmings (vegetables and fruit). At this time add the worms and cover with  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch soil. Using a spray bottle, wet the compost and cover the container, and place in a part shade area. In two weeks you can start to move the compost. Check if it needs water.

The use of worms in composting; worms are used to recycle food scrap and other organic materials into a valuable soil amendment called vermicompost or worm compost.

I use this method to do plant propagation. I leave the containers outside for three weeks, then I plant the plant sticks. Be sure that the soil is moist.

Tips for composting: do not use meat, chicken, fish, dairy products, cat or dog feces; do not use grass clippings from lawns that have been sprayed with chemicals (weed and feed). Do not use ash from charcoal.

If they deliver from Postal Services, talk to your postal person to be aware that the worms are alive and cannot be stored in the mail box or exposed to sun.

## New swale options for us in Coral Gables

We no longer need to grow grass on our swales! The City has come up with several alternative options for homeowners wishing to plant something other than grass, especially for those of us who have shade trees on our swales and struggle to keep grass growing. At this time swale plantings may only include Wart Ferns, Liriope, Variegated Liriope, Flax Lily, Philodendron "Burl Marx" or Rd Congo. Other approved options are Crushed Granite, Ollite, and Coquina Shells. To opt for one of these alternatives, owners must fill a permit application with the City of Coral Gables Public Works Dept. They are striving to make this an easy process, so if you are interested in replacing your grass (or your dirt!) with one of these attractive options, contact the Public Works Department to obtain a permit.
