





DO YOU KNOW THE THREE R'S?

To those of us of a certain age, and especially at this time of year – the 3Rs traditionally meant: Reading, 'Riting and 'Rithmetic. In the 1970s and 80s the 3Rs took on a new meaning: REDUCE, REUSE and RECYCLE.

About this same time American communities enthusiastically took on recycling programs and individual households embraced home recycling. For many years, China was the recipient of our recycled goods.

China's decision a few years ago to stop being the world's trash compactor is forcing individuals and municipalities to look at recycling differently. Communities have gone from earning money on recycled goods to spending money to get rid of it.

There is a reason that RECYCLING is the third R. We should now attempt to change our way of thinking to concentrate more on the first two Rs: REDUCE and REUSE
