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Photos 1- 4: Betsy Tilghman submitted these photos. "I have lost the identifying tag to the fragrant pink *Cattleya* pictured here. My guess is that I bought it two or three years ago on one of my Homestead outings with Susan Rodriguez. We were buying for our club plant sales, but always couldn't resist buying some special ones for ourselves, or often buying the plants that didn't sell at the sales. The two *Dendrobiums* have very different histories. The magenta *Dendrobium anosmum superbum* (#4) growing on the oak tree in my yard, is a child of the *Dendrobiums* my mother used to grow in Palm Beach. This is the orchid I have shared many times over the years with so many of you. I hope yours are doing well too! The light purple dendrobium (#3 *Dendrobium anosmum v semi-album*) is a newcomer to me. I bought it at RF orchids this year before it was budding, and it has been thrilling to watch it bloom - I adore the fragile color and sweet fragrance. And lastly, this croton in my garden (#2) is one of my favorites. I have gradually added many crotons over the years, but this original beauty I am always drawn to."

We no longer have a garden and when we did, this was one of my favorite ornamental plants. I took this photo in member Bonnie Blair's front yard. "Purple Persian Shield" is the more common name. The Latin name is "*strobilanthes dyerianus*." It grows easily from seeds or cuttings; thrives in heat and humidity, and may exceed 3ft in height; also makes an excellent houseplant; zone 8-11 perennial; has blue flower stalks.

Photo 6: Submitted by Derita Downey She labeled it "her first *Gardenia* of the Season." It looks perfect in her Bunny container. What a lovely reminder of past Spring days.



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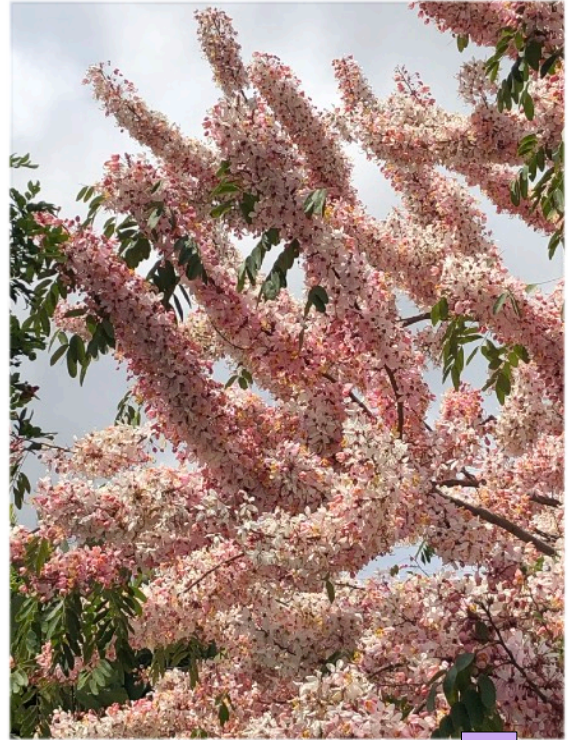


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Photo 7: Presently in the kitchen of Suzuyo Fox, the *Plectranthus* 'Mona Lavender' was bought at the Coral Pines Garden Club Plant Auction. It has shiny, dark-green leaves with purple undersides, with six inch flower spikes with lavender flowers that resemble tubular orchid blooms. You can put it outside in partial shade. It grows to 2' tall and can be used in a pot as well.

Photo 8: From Judy Mangasarian, The Pink Shower Tree. In full bloom this time of year all over Coral Gables. (This one is at the corner of Bird Road and Alhambra Circle.) *Cassia bakeriana* is one of the most successful flowering tree introductions to southern Florida in the past 15 years has been *Cassia bakeriana*. native to Thailand and Burma (Myanmar), the Pink Shower Tree blooms profusely in the spring, producing flowers that progress from pink to lighter pink to white. The flowers attract butterflies and bees. Newly-emerging leaves are velvety. This fast-growing species matures in the 20-30 ft. range, with a nearly equal spread.

C. bakeriana is not only beautiful, but also undemanding. A sunny exposure and good drainage are its only significant requirements. After the tree becomes established on its site, it will exhibit some drought tolerance. The flexible branches of this species are capable of resisting breakup in heavy winds. It also appears not to be susceptible to the stem-end borers that affect some other *Cassia* species.



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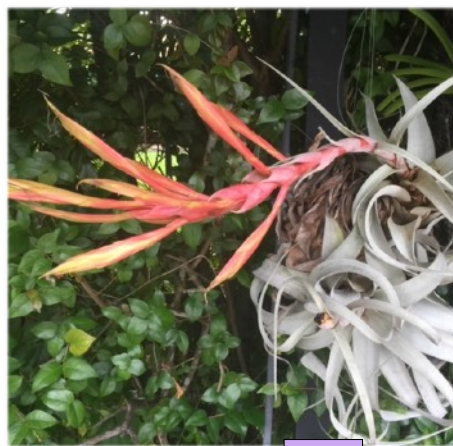

Water once a week, morning sun, feed once a month. (Photo 12) air plant - *xerographica*. Kept in same spot for 5 years. Watered once weekly. (Photo 13) Red Diamond. "I purchased this from last years plant sale (2019) Home Tour. This year I had 15 buds and all bloomed! (Blc - *Brassolaeliocattleya*) kept in heavy dappled shade/sun, water/fed once weekly."

"We bought the small tree at the tropical flowering tree society about 10 years ago, they said it was very rare. I have forgotten the name but part of the name was *odorta*. 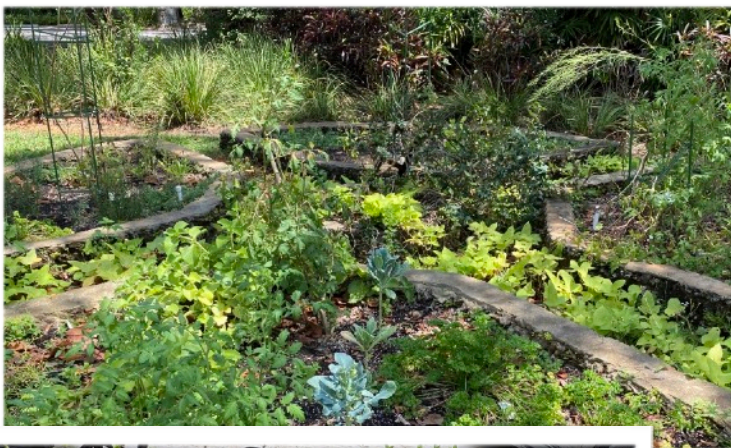
WE ASKED PAST PRESIDENT JANA WHITE WHAT KEEPS HER BUSY SINCE LEAVING MIAMI
