Cristina Soler's Sunsets



Dear members, I want to share a quick note on my passion for sunsets. The Covid confinement gave me time to enjoy more sunsets than ever before and cherish the beauty of the Gables Waterway that is east of the highway. The way the sun shines on the water an hour before sunset is so different from how it shines and reflects its abundant colors once the sun starts to set. The transition of light is what I enjoy most; it motivates me to repeat these walks as often as I can.

My routes include Riviera Drive and Granada Boulevard from Cocoplum Circle almost to U.S. 1 and back, stopping at the Hardee Bridge, the Granada Bridge, and with the best views of the sunset at the Circle Bridge, to admire the different scenes and occasional return of boaters to their homes. You can take the scenic walk 3 or 4 different ways. The result is always magnificent, and you can walk from 1.5 to 3.5 miles in an hour or hour and a half, depending on your speed. There is plenty of parking in Cartagena Circle (Cocoplum Circle). I recommend arriving at 4:30 PM and planning to return from your walk by 5:30 PM before it gets dark. Don't be surprised if you park next to another sunset admirer who wants to capture those special moments when nature transforms. Enjoy!

Judy Mangasarian's Finds on Country Club Prado

One of my favorite walks is along Country Club Prado at the northwest corner of Coral Gables. This grand avenue is split down the middle with a parklike median planted with beautiful flowering and native trees and lined with handsome homes on both sides. The walk north from South



Greenway Drive to 8th Street is approximately a mile on shady double-wide sidewalks, and at the north end you can enjoy a classic fountain and water steps feeding into a long shallow channel between pergolas covered in bougainvillea. Just to the northeast is a lush and shady park with huge oaks, and to the northwest is a beautiful Pine Rockland area. Coming back down the Prado along the west side, you will see oaks along the swale decorated with hundreds of orchids tied to their branches. Many of the homeowners between Cadiz and South Greenway have added them; and in the spring, they are gorgeous! But the most fun is to look up high in the last oak on the northwest corner of Country Club Prado and South Greenway and spy a squirrel's picnic table. It always makes me smile.

Due to transitions, changes, and the pandemic, we were privileged to have my son, daughter-in-law, and 2-year-old granddaughter live with us from May to October. Lily, my toddler granddaughter, LOVES to be outdoors; so I got plenty of exercise and personal connection. Denise West's Waterway Walk

A favorite walk is to circle the Coral Gables Waterway east of U.S. 1. Start anywhere along the loop encompassing Granada Boulevard, to Cocoplum Circle, to Riviera Drive, across the short waterway bridge along U.S. 1, to Orduna Drive, to Granada Boulevard. The full circle is 3 miles, but for a shorter walk, cross the waterway halfway at the Hardee Road Bridge and complete the loop in either direction.



This tree-canopied route passes attractive homes, lush landscaping, and provides beautiful waterway views from the 4 bridges. The walk never fails to deliver a variety of ever-changing seasonal flowers and trees in bloom. Take time at the bridges – you might see a manatee!

My walks often include North and South Greenway around the golf course. I especially enjoy walking by the home of Dr. and Mrs. Felix Ramirez. 
Nita Norman's Love of Mediterranean Architecture



Walking in Coral Gables is a study in history, architecture, and beauty. George Merrick found the Mediterranean style to be inspiring, when he creatively classified the types of homes that would showcase and codify his "City Beautiful". Although Merrick originally envisioned many "Villages" themed around architectural styles, such as Chinese, Dutch South African, French Normandy, French Country, Italian (Mediterranean), and Pioneer Villages, the dominant style of original homes built in Coral Gables reflect Mediterranean architecture, much like Palm Beach's homes that were built earlier than those in Coral Gables.

Some of the paths or streets I choose to walk, looking for Mediterranean-style homes, are around the Biltmore, Venetian Pool, St. Phillips Church, Congregational Church, Church of the Little Flower, Coral Way, Coral Gable Country Club (often too crowded), and Santa Maria. You will discover that there are many more! CAUTION: Always look for sidewalks, walk with a friend (distancing), avoid groups and wear a mask.
