Spring is in the air... Flowers everywhere



I can't get these lyrics from an old song out of my head, and no wonder, when I'm surprised by the beautiful, blush-pink blooms of the *Cassia bakeriana* everywhere. They are the tropical version of the Japanese Cherry trees lining the Tidal Basin in Washington, DC, whose blooms are celebrated every spring. We are so lucky to have our own pink beauties here in Miami. (They are non-native, but non-invasive.) The *Tabebuia chrysotrichas*, now known as *Handroanthus chrysanthus*, are also blooming along US 1 and Red Road in a stunning yellow, and in June, the Royal Poincianas will burst into flame-red, orange and gold. We live in a lovely, technicolor world!

This past month, we continued to be busy, sponsoring the planting of a second garden at Carver Middle School by TREEmendous Miami and granting four generous scholarships to deserving college and graduate students. I received the Arbor Day 2020 Proclamation from Mayor Valdes-Fauli and I presented him with our check for \$1,000, which will be used to purchase a *Lignum vitae* to be planted at Sunset Elementary School on May 3rd. We are awaiting the approval by the City of our permit to paint the exterior of the Garden Center, and soon we will install botanical markers on the trees at the Merrick House garden.

By far the most exciting project is our upcoming Photography Competition, “As I See It”, set to start on April 15th and end on May 31st. This is an online fundraiser which will be widely publicized and promises to be an annual event. 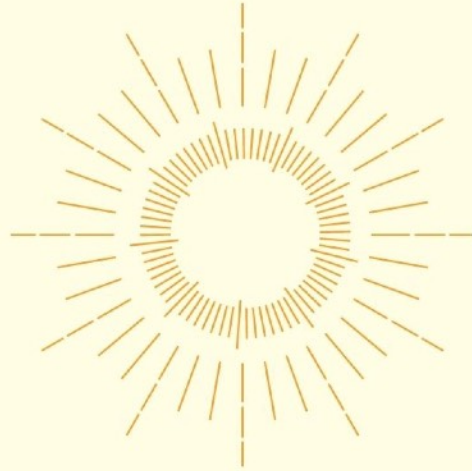

and more! Out of towners bags will be mailed.

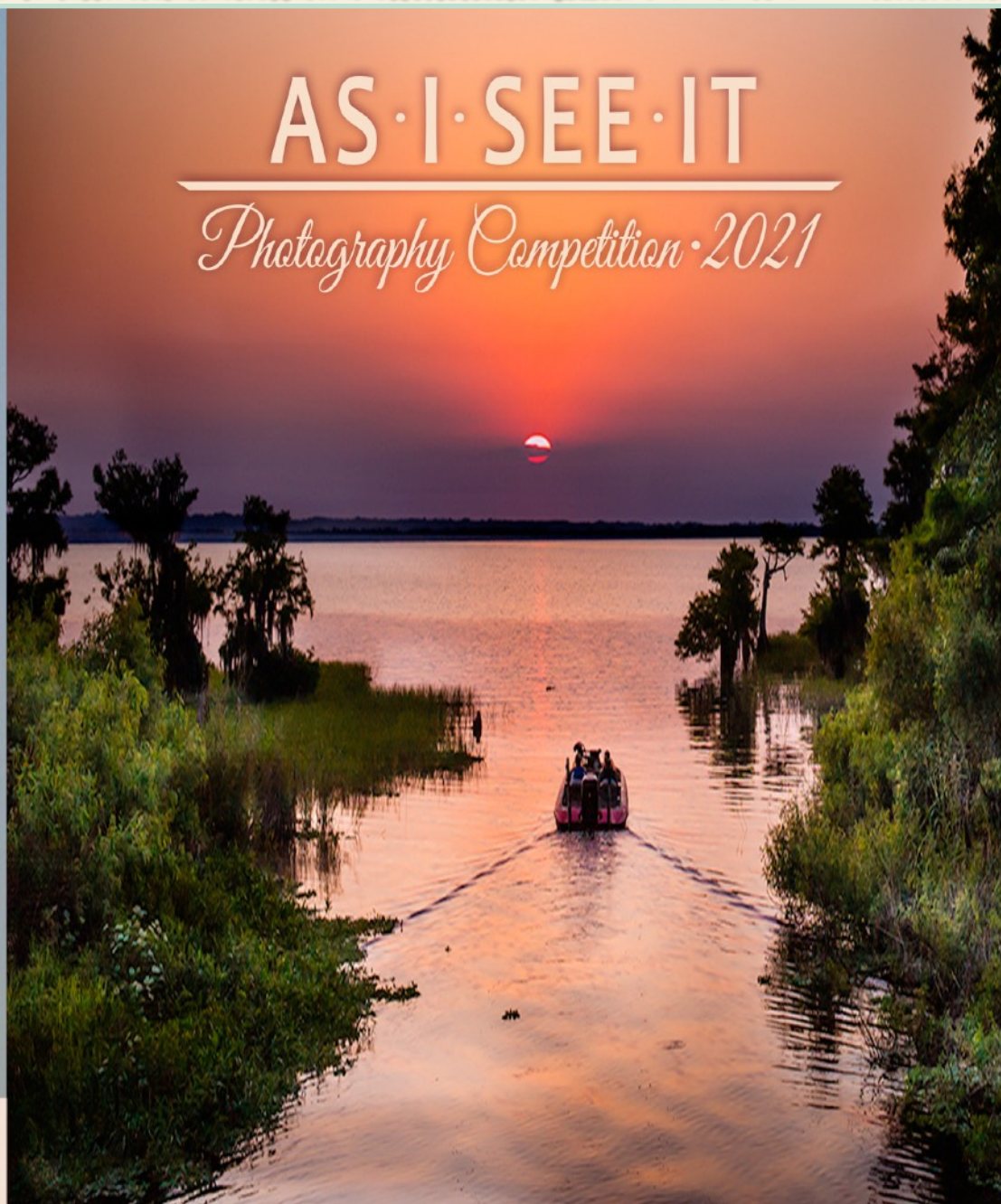

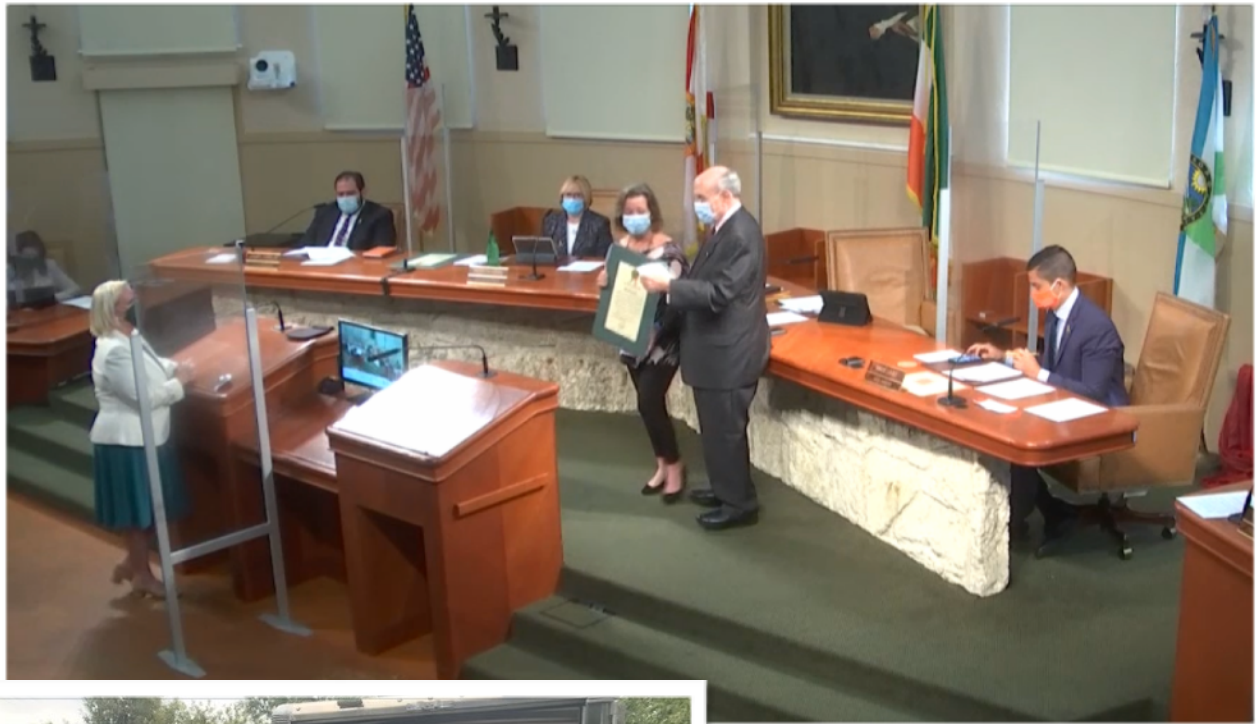

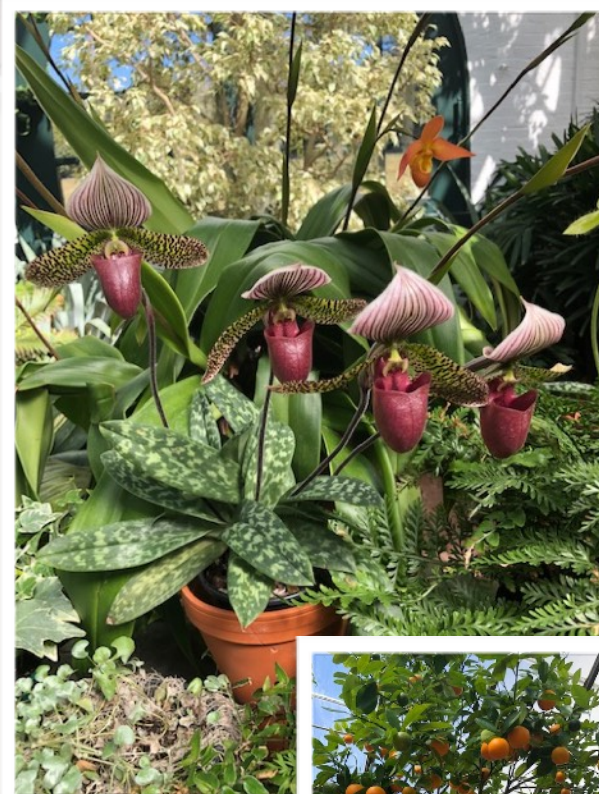

Sheran, he loves to work and is a great community outreach animal, though they can be crime fighters if the need arises. BTW, he is the first horse for mounted patrol in Coral Gables in 100 years! Chief Hudak at the Commission meeting talked about Rockaway, and he said they were hoping to add another horse soon.



Today, I invited a docent to help me map out the markers. She marked each marker on the map, & I took a photo, so we'd have a photo record of exactly the wording on the markers. I only moved one marker (ginger), & certainly move it back if you don't like it! I had no idea there were trees from Africa, Malaysia, India, Caribbean, & many more places. It was a wonderful experience to learn about the trees, & you had markers in every part of the yards! It turned out even better than I imagined.
