Butterfly of the Month: Tropical Buckeye

The Tropical Buckeye Butterfly is one of two common similar species (the other is the Mangrove Buckeye) that are found in the Southern US and in the East, the southern tip of Florida and the southern tip of Texas.

It is a large brown butterfly with dominant eyespots and trailing orange and cream-colored wing edges, with a wing span of 1 3/4" - 2 1/4".

The eyespots are used to frighten predators. Female Buckeyes are larger than males. They drink nectar with a short throat, their proboscis not being long enough to reach the bottom of tunnel-shaped flowers. Eggs are green and laid singly on host plants. Our host plant here is porterweed. The eggs of this butterfly are tiny. Buckeye caterpillars molt four times before they hang in a J shape to pupate. Underneath the old "skin" is a larger baggy one.

Gardeners often worry when their caterpillars disappear from the host plant. Predators are frequently the reason, but if a caterpillar is ready to pupate, it often leaves the plant to do so. One to two weeks after the caterpillar becomes a chrysalis, the adult butterfly emerges. A day after emerging, it begins to drink nectar.

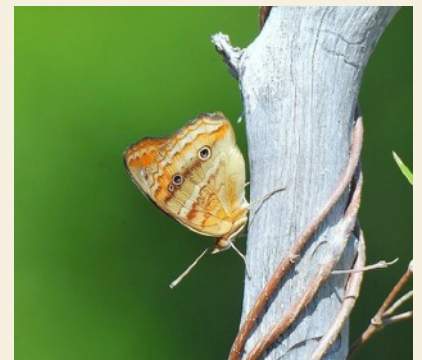

Member Profile: Fabulous Fran Reid

When asked what defines Fran, her longtime friend, Nita Norman said, “her ability to get through anything.” Nita also mentioned Fran’s commitment to the Coral Gables Garden Club over the long haul. Fran’s tenure in the Club is certainly for the long haul – she joined the Club in 1980, was President for two terms, and has been a Director of the Club for 35 years. Also, there is a continuity in Fran’s projects and passions through the years that has contributed growth, stability and stature to the Garden Club. But first, a little background.

Fran was born in Winston-Salem, NC and grew up in Charlotte, NC. At age thirteen, she was a teen model for the national magazine “Calling All Girls.” While at Queens College, she dated Ted, who became her husband in 1952, a marriage that would last 67 ½ years. At the time, Ted was a student at Davidson College, and when they married, Fran somehow managed to talk the administration into letting her become a Davidson student too, the only female student at the all-boys school.

After Davidson, the Reids moved to Philadelphia where Ted attended the University of Philadelphia Medical School. While Ted was busy with his studies, Fran was occupied with founding the Student American Association Auxiliary for all Medical Schools in the U.S.

Fran and Ted moved to Miami in 1960 for Ted’s Internship and residency at the University of Miami Medical School, and Fran attended classes at the University. After a couple of years in Kentucky with the Army, they returned to Miami. At that time, the Reid’s Miami house was a rental that had no air conditioning or heat; and Fran’s sister, Carolyn (Garden Club member, Carolyn Durham) lived with them for a time. In fact, it was during that period that Carolyn met the man who would become her beloved husband of 61 years.

In the late 1960’s, Fran and Ted moved to Coral Gables, and in 1972, they moved to their home on Alhambra Circle where Fran frequently entertained Ted’s medical colleagues and the Garden Club, as well as hosting charity events.

Fran’s life has been full and busy. She has three children and four grandchildren. In addition to the Garden Club, she had an interior design business, served as President of the Cancer Association, was active in Big Brothers/Big Sisters, was a member of the Merry Widows at Jackson Memorial, belonged to the University of Miami Women’s Guild, was a member of the P.T.A. and room mother at Carver School, spent seven years as Chair of the Coral Gables Beautification Committee and chaired a variety of committees at the Coral Reef Yacht Club. Over the years, Fran and her family have enjoyed frequent international travel, sailing and boat racing, as well as 26 years of skiing, fly fishing and other activities at their

Montana vacation home. After joining the Coral Gables Garden Club in 1980, Fran immediately became active and involved in the Club. In 1985, she became the Club’s President. One of the Club’s highest priorities was finding a home. Club meetings were being held at the Women’s Club.

The Garden Club tried to negotiate shared space with the Women’s Club, but that didn’t work out. (story continues on Page 8.)

As President, Fran took on the challenge of finding space where the Garden Club could hold its meetings and have a place of its own. She, along with other members of the Club, did extensive research of potential sites, working closely with City of Coral Gables officials. With the discovery of our current building on the grounds of the Biltmore Hotel, a new home for the Club was found and dedicated in 1989, with then Mayor, George Corrigan, Jr., City Commissioners and the City Manager present. Mayor Corrigan's predecessor, Mayor William Chapman, had been an advocate in helping the Garden Club obtain the space. Also involved were longtime Garden Club member and former Mayor Dorothy Thomson, and Raul Valdes-Fauli, Vice Mayor at the time. Nita Norman recalls a meeting where there was discussion of giving the club a 3-5-year contract for the building. Commissioner Bill Kerdyk, Jr. was present and said, "Why not just give it to them?" and it has been our Club home ever since. Fran has maintained strong interest and involvement in the Garden Center, including the recent renovation and plans for the future patio and French door entrance.

Fran has visited many gardens worldwide, but her passions are the roses that she learned how to grow and care for through the Garden Club. She also had two orchid houses at her Alhambra Circle home and raised camellias at the family's South Carolina plantation.

Carolyn, Fran's sister, tells a delightful story that says a lot about who Fran is. The two of them had been visiting a friend in California for a week. During the course of the visit, Fran bought an enormous basket and two porcelain rabbits that she was sure would be perfect for the big Garden Club year-end meeting she would be hosting when she returned. What she initially failed to take into account was how she would get these large decorative pieces home. As it turned out, Fran made the long trip from California to Miami uncomfortably crowded, with the basket and bunnies in her lap. Carolyn also mentioned that the Club meeting that Fran was hosting was the very next day at 10:00 AM. The bunnies, basket, Fran and Carolyn all made it in time for the next day's party, and the décor was, as always, beautiful. As Nita so wisely pointed out at the beginning of this story, "Fran has the ability to get through anything."
