For our November 28th meeting is Horticulture Division, "Fairchild's Favorites."



Horticulture Column: DOWN A GARDEN PATH with *Pithecellobium keyense*

Where to begin on this path? Maybe from my own brief experience with the Keys Blackbead, *Pithecellobium keyense*. Several years ago, I stumbled upon this small tree and noticed the coiled pods of red and black seeds. To my horror, I imagined that it was the dreaded toxic rosemary pea – a nightmare from my childhood where teachers warned that just one ingested pea would kill you and little boys unwittingly stuffed them up their noses.

Now, if I had looked more closely at the pods on this tree, I would have realized that the red was not really part of the pea at all, which is entirely black (hence the name blackbead), but was only a partial covering of the pea, known as an aril. Hummm, so what is an aril? An aril is a fleshy substance surrounding a seed – think pomegranate! Now I know what all that pink stuff is. So, the aril is basically a transport method for a plant whose seed may not be that delectable – something tasty for wildlife to eat as a way for the plant to disperse its seed.

We are planting 200 Keys Blackbeads at Camp Mahachee. This native shrub or small tree, found in coastal hammocks and thickets, grows only as far north as Martin County on the east coast of Florida and occasionally on the west coast. However, they are fairly common in the Keys, the Bahamas, and other parts of the Caribbean.

The Blackbead is an amazing host plant. It is the larval host for our cassius blue, large orange sulphur and Miami blue butterflies, and a nectar plant for many, many more. Birds enjoy the bright red aril and, along with mammals, hide in the security of the tree's thicket.

I am so happy (and relieved!) to have met *Pithecellobium keyense*. Discovering the Blackbead's environmental merits, with its bonus of fragrant white to pink powderpuff flowers peaking in spring and summer and giving way to charmingly curled seed pods, I think I need one of these in my yard. How about you?

Proposed Changes to the CGGC By-Laws, November 2022

Article IV, Section 1c, Lines 7-10:

Proposed Change: Sustaining Members shall receive first preference when seeking to reinstate their Active Membership

Status by applying for Active Membership by one week prior to The Board of Managers Meeting in March.

Article IV, Section 1d:

Proposed Change: Non-Resident membership: A member in good standing' who is subject to a change in residence outside Miami-Dade County, shall be granted the privilege of becoming

A Non-Resident Member. The member may not vote, hold office, or be required to participate or be responsible for the purchase of fundraising event tickets. The Member will receive the Hibiscus Leaflet and may attend meetings when visiting. If a Non-Resident Member moves back to Coral Gables, or Miami-Dade County, the Member shall automatically be reinstated to Membership.

Article IV, Section 1f: Proposed Change, Emeritus Members shall be those who have attained the age of 85 or have paid dues for 40 years and have been Active Members for a minimum of ten years. They shall have all the privileges of membership and none of the requirements.

Article V, Section 1c: Proposed Change: Annual Dues of Sustaining members shall be \$125.00, which includes dues to The Florida Federation of Garden Clubs.

Article V, Section 2d: Omit

Article VII, Section 2, Lines 7-10: Proposed Change: Nominees for President must have served on the Board of Managers for at least 2 years, and the First Vice-President and Second Vice-President must have served at least one year on the Board of Managers.

Article IX, Section 1, Proposed Change: The President shall appoint the Parliamentarian and Chairs of committees and shall be an Ex-officio Member of all committees except the Nominating Committee, but may serve as a consultant.

Article XI, Section1: Proposed Change: Members of Coral Gables Garden Club may make donations to the club to honor or memorialize someone. Monies in the fund shall be spent on special projects. A note shall be sent to the person being honored or the family of the deceased by the Corresponding Secretary. The Corresponding Secretary will also send a letter to the donor acknowledging the gift and its dollar amount.

Standing Rule 11: Proposed Change: Legacy members shall be those who have been Active Members and participants in the club for 25 years. They will be recognized at the Annual Meeting in their 25th year of membership.

Hunker down for a bit of the rich [history of Thanksgiving](#). Today, Thanksgiving takes place over one decadent day — maybe two, if you count [Black Friday history](#). But the original Pilgrims really went all out. In November 1621, the settlers' first corn harvest proved so successful Governor William Bradford reportedly invited the Plymouth colonists' Native American allies to enjoy the fruits of their labor. Members of the Wampanoag tribe came bearing food to share. They had so much bounty, the revelers decided to extend the affair.

While most of us enjoy turkey as the centerpiece of our table, no one can say for sure whether it was even on the menu back in 1621. However, [the original guests did indulge in other foods](#) like lobster, seal, and swan. The Wampanoag also reportedly brought five deer to the celebration.
